
Sec. 553. Rule making

- (a) This section applies, according to the provisions thereof, except to the extent that there is involved –
- (1) a military or foreign affairs function of the United States; or
- (2) a matter relating to agency management or personnel or to public property, loans, grants, benefits, or contracts.
- (b) General notice of proposed rule making shall be published in the Federal Register, unless persons subject thereto are named and either personally served or otherwise have actual notice thereof in accordance with law. The notice shall include
 - (1) a statement of the time, place, and nature of public rule making proceedings;
 - (2) reference to the legal authority under which the rule is proposed; and
- (3) either the terms or substance of the proposed rule or a description of the subjects and issues involved.

Except when notice or hearing is required by statute, this subsection does not apply -

- (A) to interpretative rules, general statements of policy, or rules of agency organization, procedure, or practice; or
- (B) when the agency for good cause finds (and incorporates the finding and a brief statement of reasons therefor in the rules issued) that notice and public procedure thereon are impracticable, unnecessary, or contrary to the public interest.
- (c) After notice required by this section, the agency shall give interested persons an opportunity to participate in the rule making through submission of written data, views, or arguments with or without opportunity for oral presentation. After consideration of the relevant matter presented, the agency shall incorporate in the rules adopted a concise general statement of their basis and purpose. When rules are required by statute to be made on the record after opportunity for an agency hearing, sections 556 and 557 of this title apply instead of this subsection.
- (d) The required publication or service of a substantive rule shall be made not less than 30 days before its effective date, except -
 - (1) a substantive rule which grants or recognizes an exemption or relieves a restriction;
 - (2) interpretative rules and statements of policy; or
 - (3) as otherwise provided by the agency for good cause found and published with the rule.
- (e) Each agency shall give an interested person the right to petition for the issuance, amendment, or repeal of a rule.

RegInfo.gov is a United States Government website produced by the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) and the General Services Administration (GSA).

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

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Current Unified Agenda of Regulatory and Deregulatory Actions

The Regulatory Information Service Center (RISC) was created in June 1981. The Center undertakes projects that will facilitate development of and access to information about Federal regulatory and deregulatory activities. It accomplishes this by gathering and publishing information on Federal regulations and their effects on society. The Center provides this information to the President, Congress, agency officials, and the general public to help them better understand and manage the regulatory process. The Center's principal publication is the Unified Agenda, which is published in the spring and fall of each year. Since 1978, Federal agencies have been required by Executive orders to publish agendas of regulatory and deregulatory activities. The Regulatory Plan, which is published as part of the fall edition of the Agenda, identifies regulatory priorities and contains additional detail about the most important significant regulatory actions that agencies expect to take in the coming year.

Currently, RegInfo.gov maintains the spring and fall editions of the Unified Agenda of Federal Regulatory and Deregulatory Actions beginning with fall 1995. Later this year, all prior editions beginning with spring 1983 will be made available on this site.



Title: Nutrition Labeling of Single-Ingredient Products and Ground or Chopped Meat and Poultry Products

Abstract: FSIS has proposed to amend the Federal meat and poultry products inspection regulations to require nutrition labeling for the major cuts of single-ingredient, raw meat and poultry products, either on their label or at their point-of-purchase, unless an exemption applies. FSIS also proposed to require nutrition information on the label of ground or chopped meat and poultry products, unless an exemption applies. The requirements for ground or chopped products will be consistent with those for multi-ingredient products. FSIS also proposed to amend the nutrition labeling regulations to provide that when a ground or chopped product does not meet the regulatory criteria to be labeled "low fat," a lean percentage claim may be included on the label or in labeling, as long as a statement of the fat percentage also is displayed on the label or in labeling.

Title: Greenhouse Gas Mandatory Reporting Rule

Abstract: The FY2008 Consolidated Appropriations Act, which was signed into law on December 26, 2007, authorized funding for EPA to "develop and publish a draft rule not later than 9 months after the date of enactment of this Act, and a final rule not later than 18 months after the date of enactment of this Act, to require mandatory reporting of greenhouse gas emissions above appropriate thresholds in all sectors of the economy of the United States." The accompanying joint explanatory statement directed EPA to "use its existing authority under the Clean Air Act" to develop a mandatory greenhouse gas reporting rule. The joint explanatory statement went on to say that "The Agency is further directed to include in its rule reporting of emissions resulting from upstream production and downstream sources, to the extent that the Administrator deems it appropriate." Accordingly this rulemaking would establish monitoring, reporting, and recordkeeping requirements on facilities that produce, import, or emit greenhouse gases above a specific threshold in order to provide comprehensive and accurate data to support a range of future climate policy options.

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


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RISC, ROCIS, REGINFO & RINs

Resources for the Regulatory Process



RISC

The Regulatory Information Service Center (RISC) is a component of the Office of Governmentwide Policy at the U.S. General Services Administration. RISC compiles information about Federal regulations under development and makes this information available to the public in the semiannual *Unified Agenda of Federal Regulatory and Deregulatory Actions*. The fall editions include *The Regulatory Plan*, which has additional information about the most important significant regulatory actions. The Unified Agenda and the Plan provide the public with the most comprehensive source of information available about regulatory actions that Federal agencies are considering or planning. The complete Agenda and Plan are published online at http://reginfo.gov. The Plan is also printed in the Federal Register.

The Unified Agenda also helps Federal agencies comply with the Regulatory Flexibility Act's requirement to publish "regulatory flexibility agendas." This law requires agencies to consider the special needs and concerns of small businesses, organizations, and governmental jurisdictions when adopting regulations. By providing computer support and a uniform format, RISC makes the compilation of this information more efficient for participating agencies, with projected savings of both time and money. The regulatory flexibility portion of the Unified Agenda is printed in the Federal Register.

RISC provides information support services to the Office of Management and Budget's Office of Information and Regulatory Affairs (OIRA). RISC's publications, databases and computer system enable OIRA to carry out its responsibilities for coordination and review of Federal regulations under Executive Order 12866 and its information collection review function under the Paperwork Reduction Act.

ROCIS

RISC and OIRA have worked together to create a modern computer system to manage both RISC's and OIRA's missions. The new system is known as "ROCIS" (RISC / QIRA Consolidated Information System), which is pronounced "ROW-kiss." ROCIS replaces and upgrades OIRA's 20-year-old computer systems and improves OIRA's ability to communicate with Federal agencies and the public. ROCIS has three components, which support the following related functions: (1) RISC's compilation and publication of the Unified Agenda; (2) OIRA's review of regulations; and (3) OIRA's review of information collections.

For OIRA's review functions, ROCIS replaces two elaborate paper-based processes with web-enabled electronic submission of agency materials and allows OIRA to track agency submissions and manage its own workflow. Additional enhancements are planned that will coordinate Unified Agenda submissions with regulatory reviews, so that the information published in the Unified Agenda is as up-to-date and accurate as possible. When fully operational, ROCIS will also be able to prepare final regulatory documents in a format that agencies can use for submission to the *Federal Register* for publication.

OIRA and RISC have been collecting data on regulations and information collections since the early 1980s. The ROCIS database contains the historical data and will continue to collect and incorporate similar information on current activity.

REGINFO

RISC established the Reginfo.gov Internet site in 1998, initially to provide the public with databases, search tools and links to the Unified Agenda and several other sources of regulatory information. In 2005, RISC and OIRA cooperated to redesign and expand Reginfo.gov to provide the public, for the first time, with access to information from ROCIS about current and past regulatory reviews by OIRA. When the information collection module of ROCIS was completed, the Reginfo.gov website added a similar level of access for OIRA reviews of agency information collections. These features have greatly expanded public access to both processes and the resulting regulations and approved information collections.

Since fall 2007, online publication at Reginfo.gov has been the principal means of disseminating the Unified Agenda, replacing the prior practice of printing the entire Agenda in the Federal Register. Reginfo.gov also contains detailed current and historical information about OIRA reviews, plus links to a variety of sources of information relating to regulation such as databases and search tools for legislation and regulations, Federal agency home pages, and Executive orders. It also provides links to OIRA's oversight and implementation of governmentwide policies on information technology, information quality, privacy and statistics.

RINs

RINs are "Regulation Identifier Numbers," which help the public to identify and follow the progress of each regulatory action, or rulemaking proceeding, in the Unified Agenda, the *Federal Register* and on Reginfo.gov. Each regulatory action retains the same RIN throughout the entire rulemaking process.

A RIN consists of a 4-digit agency code plus a 4-character alphanumeric code, assigned sequentially, that identifies the individual regulation under development. For example, all RINs for the Occupational Safety and Health Administration have agency code 1218. The RIN for OSHA's rulemaking on hazard communication is 1218-AC20.

ROCIS assigns a RIN to each regulatory action that will appear in the Unified Agenda, in accordance with Executive Order 12866, Regulatory Planning and Review. OIRA uses RINs to track regulations that agencies submit for review. If an information collection review is requested in connection with a specific regulation, the RIN is also used within ROCIS to link related OIRA reviews. OIRA and Federal Register guidelines encourage agencies to include RINs in regulatory documents that they publish in the Federal Register. Agencies can obtain RINs, when needed, through their Unified Agenda contacts or from RISC.
