Gov Docs at HCC Library....

- Small depository at just over 15% depository since 1967
- Partially Integrated Collection
- Majority of Gov Docs collection cataloged and shelved by SuDocs number
 - Processed, cataloged, and shelved by Gov Docs staff
 - Print collection on 2nd floor stacks in between the stacks of LC call number Reference and Legal Reference Collections
 - The Gov Doc stacks are labeled with the FDLP logo seals and SuDocs Classification posters
 - Microfiche and CD collections on 2nd floor in room behind Circulation Desk – room called "Media Collection" in catalog with several collections

Gov Docs at HCC Library....

- Integrated Gov Docs
 - Decision made by Depository Coordinator and Public Services Librarian
 - · Based on find ability and usage in the catalog and on the shelves
 - Annual titles like Statistical Abstract of the United States, County & City Data Book, and The United States Government Manual found by LC call number in Reference Collection
 - "Pretty Gov Doc" cover titles like Black Americans in Congress 1870-2007 in Reference and Women in Congress 1917-2006 in Main
 - Processed by Gov Docs staff and given to appropriate catalogers
 - Main circulating collection on 3rd floor, and Reference & Legal Reference collections on 2nd floor all cataloged by LC call number
 - Periodicals are not cataloged by any call number and do not circulate. but have been given item records to be found by keyword search in ILS

Gov Docs at HCC Library....

- Marking Gov Docs in Integrated Collections
 - Label SuDocs number and item number inside
 - Depository stamp inside
 - FDLP stickers on covers and/or inside
 - Why do these?
 - Bring attention to Gov Docs in Integrated Collections
 - For easier N&O's during weeding process
 - For any future transition of documents back and forth between collections

Gov Docs at HCC Library....

- Cataloging Gov Docs in Integrated Collections
 - Keep both 086 (SuDocs #) and 074 (Item #) in bib record as well as 050 (LC #)
 - Why do this?
 - For easier N&O's during weeding process
 - For any future transition of documents back and forth between collections
 - Experimenting with LCSH Subject Heading "Government Publications" in local 690 field
 - Not displaying in HIP only the 650 will display
 - Working with ILS System Specialist on standards for fields that both display and are searchable in HIP

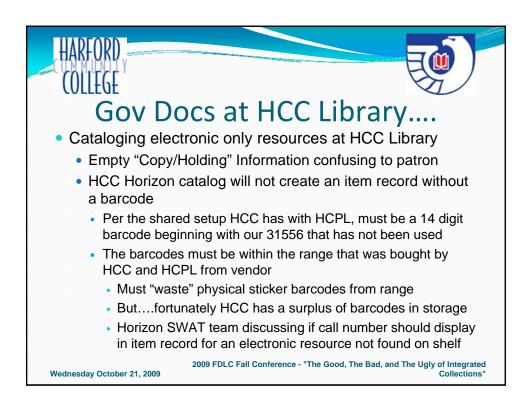

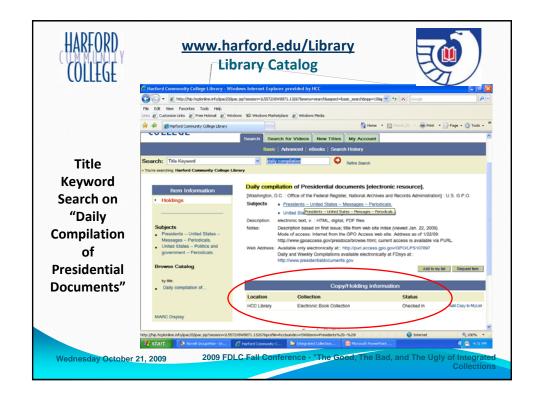

Gov Docs at HCC Library....

- ILS is Sirsi/Dynix Horizon client 7.4 and HIP (Horizon Information Portal) 3.09
 - HCC Library shares catalog and borrowing privileges with Harford County Public Library (HCPL) branches
 - HCC Library Horizon SWAT Team Summer 2009 to present
 - Created proposal for consistent cataloging of item records of electronic resources among collections – under review
 - All collections (print and electronic) need item records why?
 - Keyword searches find just HCC Library items browse searches find both HCC & HCPL

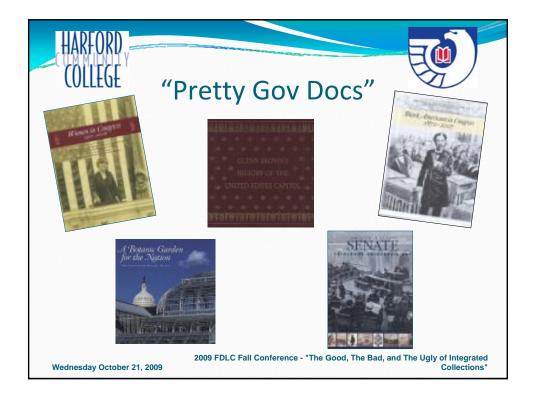


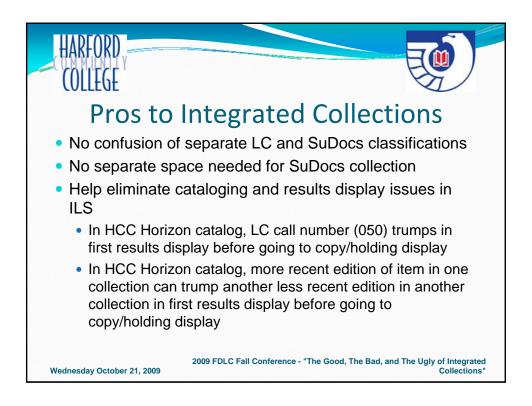
Cons to Integrated Collections

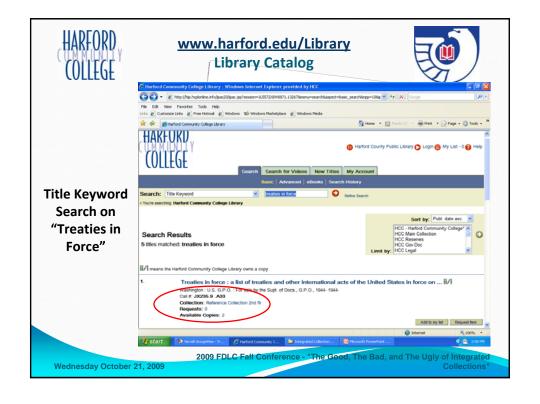
- "Pretty Gov Docs" pulled into other collections at HCC
 - In Main Collection: (Circulating)
 - Glenn Brown's History of the United States Capitol
 - Women in Congress 1917-2006
 - A Botanic Garden for the Nation : the United States Botanic Garden
 - United States Senate Catalogue of Graphic Art
 - In Reference Collection: (Non-Circulating) Issues?
 - Black Americans in Congress 1870-2007
- Makes Gov Docs collection even more unattractive and inhibiting to traditional age college students
- Detracts from potential usage, circulation, and understanding of the importance of a depository collection – felt like "secondary" collection

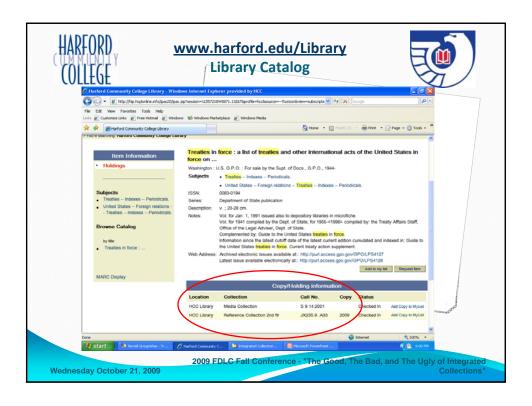

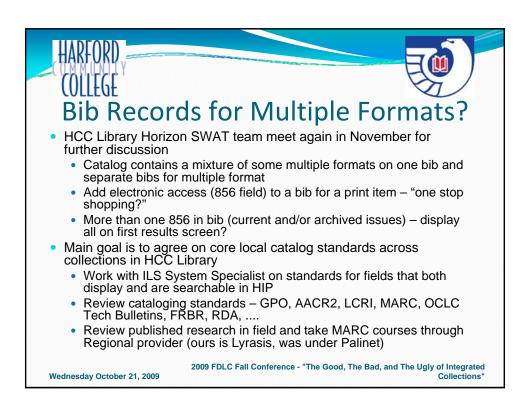

What is an integrated collection?

Any depository collection which is partially or completely integrated into a library's regular collection and/or cataloged using a system other

than Su Doc numbers.

How it is at Catholic University http://www.pucpr.edu

Government Docs is part of technical services
We catalog using Dewy and virtually all
Government Docs are integrated into the
Collection.

Most documents are in the reference department.

Cataloging has not been consistent or wellcontrolled

Most print materials are classified by SuDoc number and shelved in a designated Government Documents collection, located on the 1st floor of our library

Microform materials are kept in our Microforms collection, arranged in cabinets by SuDoc number. The collection also includes unclassified microforms, which are arranged in separate cabinets. This collection is housed in a room on the 1st floor, very close to the Government Documents collection

NOVA Southeastern, cont.

Some documents are placed in the Reference collection while they are current; when a new edition is released, we return the older edition to our Government Documents collection. The United States government manual and Statistical abstract of the United States are examples. Editions in Reference are given LC call numbers as well as SuDoc numbers. When an edition is moved to the Government Documents collection, the LC call number label is removed and the SuDoc number is used to shelve the item. The bibliographic record contains both an LC call number and a SuDoc call number, both of which are indexed.

NOVA Southeastern, cont.

- Some documents are kept permanently in our unclassified Federal collection. *U.S. Reports* is one example. All pieces have SuDoc number labels, but these are ignored in shelving. The bibliographic records contain indexed SuDoc numbers.
- Some documents are shelved in our Federal collection while they are current, and moved to the Government Documents collection when they are replaced by newer versions. The Code of Federal Regulations is an example of this treatment.
