# How are college students counted by the U.S. Census Bureau?

College students living at their parental home while attending college - Counted at their parental home.

College students living away from their parental home while attending college in the U.S. (living either on-campus or off-campus) - Counted at the on-campus or off-campus residence where they live and sleep most of the time.

College students living away from their parental home while attending college in the U.S. (living either on-campus or off-campus) but staying at their parental home while on break or vacation - Counted at the on-campus or off-campus residence where they live and sleep most of the time.

U.S. college students living outside the U.S. while attending college outside the U.S. - Not counted in the census.

### What types of data are affected?

- Population
- Race
- Poverty



In many cities college students are a significant proportion of the population.

- Burlington, VT 29.8%
- Charlottesville, VA 29.6%
- College Station, TX 47.3%
- U.S. 7.5%

(Enrolled in college or graduate school, 2008-2012 American Community Survey 5-Year Estimates)





Proportion of Black or African-American Alone Population 18-24 years old

- College Station, TX 22.3%
- U.S. 11.9%

(Sex by Age (Black or African-American Alone), 2008-2012 American Community Survey 5-Year Estimates)





- •College students living in dormitories are "not part of the poverty universe used for the official poverty measure." (Bishaw, 1-2.)
- •The poverty status of college students residing with parents or relatives is determined together with their families. (Bishaw, 1.)
- •Off-campus students not living with parents or relatives are included in the poverty universe. (Bishaw, 2.)

#### Population

- Political representation and partisan politics
- Wide range of government funding

#### Race

 Diversity – Including students may increase or decrease measures of diversity and segregation

#### Poverty

- Inflated poverty rates may result in misdirection of funds
- Should students even be included in the poverty universe?

# How are college students counted in other countries?

#### England and Wales

 Students counted at school address but also included at home address for basic demographic information

#### Canada

 Students living with parents for part of the year counted at parental residence.
