

What is dLOC?

■ 39 Partners – Caribbean, Europe and US

- Over 35 million hits since 2006
- 2 million pages of open access content
- 14,500 titles with 85,000 items



- Educational Outreach and Scholarly Collaborations

dLOC Executive Board Meeting ACURIL 2012 Haiti

- Grant of Permissions: To digitize, distribute, and archive the title(s) for nonprofit, educational purposes via the Internet or successive technologies.
- Ownership: Digital resources remain the property of the contributing institution. Nothing in the partnership agreement precludes the contributing institution from simultaneously contributing its content to other digital libraries or hosting the content locally.

dLOC's milestones

Caribbean Libraries and Archives shared vision to develop digital preservation and access for their collections.

- 2004: Caribbean and Florida librarians develop framework, objectives and governance structure
- 2005-2009: Department of Education Funding to build technology, buy equipment and train partners
- 2009-2011: Department of Education Funding to develop Caribbean Newspaper Digital Library
- 2011: DOE funding cut; Collaborative Funding Model Introduced
- 2014: Over \$100,000 raised in membership dues




dLOC Training Components

- In-person, on-site large scale training
- In-person, on-site small group training of technical staff
- Large group voluntary training during conferences
- Small group training in Florida
- Independent learning manual, videos, documentation, sample forms



Online Learning Modules

- Create a program with a formal certificate of completion; multiple levels if possible
- Break down concepts into concrete blocks with assessments
- Offer live webinars and recorded lectures to accommodate various learning styles
- Create a space for individual questions and a public forum for participants to share experiences, questions and concerns

dLOC Lessons for Gov Docs Collaboration

- Build upon existing networks and shared institutional goals
- Promote shared technology in exchange for access to collections for local expertise
- Break large tasks into manageable pieces
- Create spaces for in-person collaboration
- When possible, dedicated project managers provide key support for collaboration
