



# LAW LIBRARY DIGITAL AND PRINT COLLECTIONS

The Law Library of Congress is the largest law library in the world, providing access to nearly 3 million volumes concerning domestic, foreign, comparative, and international law. You can search and browse the Law Library's collection of materials through the [Library of Congress catalog](#).

## Digital

The Law Library of Congress provides access to a vast amount of born digital and digitized materials through its site, [Law.gov](#). A particular highlight of this collection is Law Library of Congress [foreign, comparative and international law reports](#). The Law Library specializes in foreign law.

## Print

The law collection currently consists of more than one million titles comprising over 2.9 million volumes concerning both foreign and domestic law. Over 50% of the Law Library's collection is in a language other than English, and the Law Library has foreign law specialists from around the world to make use of this collection by preparing reports that inform Congress.
