Independence Makes IG's Unique

- ☐ The IG Act and its amendments have statutory guarantees of independence
 - ☐ Access to records...yes, all GPO records
 - ☐ Law enforcement authority
 - ☐ Independent Counsel to the IG
 - ☐ Separate budget and hiring authorities
 - ☐ IG salary, hiring, and firing protections

- ☐ Special Agents
- ☐ We investigate fraud, potential high risk, systematic vulnerabilities in GPO programs and projects, serious employee integrity matters
- ☐ Law enforcement authority




Audits Division

- ☐ The goal to improve GPO programs and activities
- ☐ Timely, balanced, credible, and independent financial and performance audits
- ☐ OIG audits are performed in accordance with Generally Accepted Government Auditing Standards (GAGAS) issued by the Comptroller General of the








Inspections Division

- ☐ The goal to improve GPO programs and operations
- ☐ Flexible and tailored: Focus on **program** management
- ☐ OIG inspections are performed in accordance with CIGIE Inspection Standards

Office of Investigations

- ☐ Responsible for all investigative activities relating to GPO's programs and operations
- ☐ Investigations must have a GPO nexus
- ☐ Investigative outcomes may lead to criminal, civil, and/or administrative remedies

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What is Fraud?

- ☐ Fraud has these elements:
 - Misrepresentation
 - ☐ of a material fact
 - ☐ with the **intent** to deceive




Who Commits Fraud?

- □ People do!
 - □ Employees or management
 - ☐ Contractor personnel <u>or</u> government employees
- □Companies can also be held liable for the actions of their employees




Why do People Commit Fraud?



Common Types of Fraud

- □ False claims / false statements
- ☐ Mischarging: overcharging, defective pricing
- □ Product substitution / Counterfeit parts
- □Kickbacks, bribery, gratuities, conflict of interest
- ☐ Theft of government property
- □ Embezzlement
- □Computer crimes
- □Collusive bidding/bid rigging/price fixing/antitrust



Types of Investigations

- ☐ Criminal Potential violations of Federal law punishable by imprisonment, fines, restitution or probation.
- ☐ Civil Civil matters may be addressed during a criminal investigation or as the sole focus of an investigative proceeding and are generally punishable by fines. Double and treble damages may apply in False Claims cases.
- ☐ Administrative The act committed or the alleged infraction involves violations of Federal rules or regulations. Can apply to individual and/or organizations and leads to corrective actions, systematic changes, employee removal and/or suspension, monetary recoveries.

Red Flags

- ☐ Frequent sole source contracts / non-competitive awards
- □Unusually high indirect charges
- □Double / inflated charges have to be frequently contested
- ☐ Frequently disallowed costs
- □ Lack of supporting documentation
- □Supporting documents for invoices look "created"

Red Flags (cont.)

- □Contractor has poor management officials
- □Restriction of records / original records not available
- ☐ Charging maximum allowable price on invoices
- □Poor internal controls
- □ Project milestones / deliverables are constantly delayed

What Can You Do?

- ☐ Watch for "red flags" when performing duties
- ☐ Be a skeptic (low estimates, quick turnaround, sole source, etc.)
- ☐ Be accessible to hear complaints from project managers, technical reps, contractors, and subcontractors
- □ Provide OIG contact information to contractors and subcontractors
- ☐ When in doubt, ask the OIG

What Can You Do?

- ☐ Ensure all purchases are legal, proper, reasonable and satisfy a bona fide need
- ☐ Maintain all purchase card records and documentation
- ☐ Approving Officials, perform their duties diligently and judiciously
- ☐ Maintain separation of purchase card holder, hand receipt holder, and approving official
- ☐ Have a copy of the contract and all modifications readily available

Case Studies: Misuse of GPO Vehicle

- ☐ In 2024, the OIG began a proactive investigative initiative to identify potential misuse of GPO-owned vehicles
- ☐ Investigators identified a GPO vehicle with unexplained travel
- ☐ Investigators were able to isolate the vehicle use to a single GPO employee



Case Studies: Misuse of GPO Vehicle

- ☐ The investigation substantiated over 100 incidents of misuse over several years
 - ☐ Total cumulative unaccountable time was over 3 weeks
- ☐ The investigation also found that the subject employee's manager was knowledgeable of the vehicle misuse and failed to take action against the employee

☐ Kyana Washington worked for a company that contracted with the Government Publishing Office to provide support for Acquisition Services. Washington's duties at GPO included assisting contract officers with acquisition planning and solicitation, source section, the preparation and issuance of contracts, delivery orders, and the modifications and management of various contractual vehicles.

- ☐ In August 2021, Washington met an individual at a social gathering
- ☐ This individual's business provided consulting services that included finding opportunities for his affiliate companies to secure government contracts
- □ At the social gathering, Washington informed the individual that she worked in contracting at GPO. Washington told the individual that she did not have direct authority over GPO's contracts, but her supervisor did, and Washington's supervisor followed her recommendations

- ☐ On August 13, 2021, Washington met the individual at a restaurant in Maryland. Washington told him that she could help him get contracts at GPO and wanted to be paid 20% of the value of the contracts that she steered to the individual.
- ☐ The individual told Washington that he could not pay her directly, so the two agreed that he would pay Washington through her daughter to disguise the bribe payments.
- □Washington brought her laptop to the meeting and showed the individual confidential information about then-available GPO contracts.
- ☐ The two identified a contract which Washington could plausibly steer to one of the individual's affiliated businesses.

- ☐ In September 2021, Washington provided the individual with screenshots of her GPO computer that contained nonpublic information about GPO contracting opportunities.
- ☐ The individual provided Washington with the names of 3 companies he was working with, and Washington prepared an official memorandum for GPO, indicating that quotes were received from only 3 companies (the 3 companies named by the individual), with the recommendation that the contract by awarded to a predetermined company (Company A).

- ☐ The contract was originally valued at \$1,000,000, to be paid out over 5 years; however, Washington restructured the contract so that it was valued at just under \$200,000 to be paid out in one year, and subject to renewal under the same terms for a total of 5 years. This restructuring eliminated the requirement of a higher level of approval and instead only required the approval of Washington's supervisor, who approved the award.
- ☐ Company A agreed to pay the individual a percentage of profits from the contract, and the individual agreed to pay Washington a percentage of the money he received.

- ☐ Washington received a total of \$7,098.37 in bribe payments.
- ☐ In September 2024, Kyana Washington pled guilty to conspiracy to commit bribery and honest services wire fraud.
- ☐ In January 2025, Washington was sentenced to 2 years of supervised probation, with 6 months home confinement.
