# Avoiding the Needle in the Haystack: Identifying Non-Metropolitan Communities Needing Assistance

This poster will demonstrate how to use the "List of Distressed or Underserved Nonmetropolitan Middle-Income Geographies," which is published by the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve, the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation, and the Office of the Comptroller of the Currency. The report is organized by state/territory, county, and census tract. A sample census tract will be used and analyzed with data from the Census Bureau and other Federal and state-level agencies. The report's methodology and background will also be explained.

# Celebrating 50 Years in the FDLP! Partnering with Your Campus Institution for Even Larger Promotional Outreach and Awareness!

Harford Community College Library, a 17% selective depository, celebrated 50 years in the FDLP in 2017 while the academic campus celebrated 60 years. Similar to the 40th FDLP anniversary activities in 2007, the Library celebrated the anniversary on Constitution Day, promoting the milestone to both the campus population and the surrounding community. This time, the HCC Library expanded that promotion to tie into the campus Hays-Heighe House's opening of its "APG Tech Revolution" exhibit, also celebrated by the campus' 60th, and partnered with the campus Paralegal Student Association, handing out Pocket Constitutions and promoting the Office of Student Activities' voter registration event. This poster will include a timeline and examples illustrating the extensive planning, research, marketing, and usage of promotional tools and anniversary logos from GPO and from our own institution. This resulted in a full day of events that included two living history Benjamin Franklin "Scientist & Inventor" Constitution Day programs, our FDLP 50th awards ceremony with the Honorable Davita Vance-Cooks as guest, and celebration cake, displays, and a giveaway of Pocket Constitutions and swag in the Library.

#### Celebration of 50 years of Being a Depository Library

# Office of Minority Health Resource Center: Celebrating 30 Years of Library Service to Communities of Color

Established in 1987, OMHRC is celebrating its 30th anniversary this year. Within the Center, the Knowledge Center Library maintains a collection of 60,000 books, Government documents and consumer brochures related to health issues that disproportionately affect minorities. Over the past 30 years, the library has progressed from providing answers to public inquiries solely by telephone and mail, to a publicly accessible collection, of which 70% can be accessed online. This poster will visualize the historical progression from core library services to outreach projects such as conference presentations, webinars, publications, social media, and library collaborations. # Who Gets to Graduate? How College Administrators Can Use Census Data in the Recruitment of Students
