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*Over the last decade, there have been significant changes in the library landscape, especially in the Government documents domain. Gone are the fully staffed, stand-alone documents departments with their specialized staff that were solely dedicated to the business of Government publications. Now, service points have merged, processing and technical services activities have been integrated into the larger library organization, departments have been downsized, and documents professionals may wear multiple hats or are responsible for several subject areas within their home institutions. Meanwhile, Government information is still perceived to be an oddity that the majority of our non-documents colleagues reject. However, the Government documents world offers librarians an opportunity to develop a diverse skill set that traverses the field of librarianship and in turn encourages unique perspectives, inventive problem solving, and an in-depth understanding of the information life cycle. For decades, the Program managed an offsite facility known as the Center for AeroSpace Information (CASI) which served as the clearinghouse for documents and microfiche. With the advent of the internet and digital collections, the need for an offsite processing facility ceased and CASI closed. Mr. Steeman will highlight current STI services and products, most notably the NASA Technical Reports Server (NTRS), the Research Access effort, and the Program's five-year strategic plan.</i></p>	Jackson

Accordingly, this presentation will review the front page information on patents (identifying the invention, the inventor, and providing detailed classification information), as well as the specification (providing a detailed explication of the invention, cross-referencing drawings, and providing a foundation for the inventors' claims). Once the components of the modern document are understood, the available fields in USPTO's Patents Full-Text database will be easily recognizable.</i></p> <p><i>The presentation will also briefly contrast the modern patent documents with their historic predecessors which were granted under different standards and, before 1836, consisted of a partial, reconstructed collection, the X-patents. The presentation will briefly mention additional improvement, design, and plant patents.</i></p> <p><i>Although a discussion of the wide area of documents published by the Patent Office would be beyond the scope of this presentation, handouts covering this material will be distributed and very briefly introduced.</i></p>

*Specific existing web guides will be shown and the rationale and thought behind the formatting thereof described. There are many U.S. (& state) Government materials in Spanish, and pulling a useful collection together helps make it easier to show them to Spanish readers. Another guide on food demonstrates how certain topics lend themselves to guides that consist almost exclusively of Government resources. The presenter’s “food” guide created for her university’s first year composition program was liked so much (and was the site’s most used page) that her proposed future ones on energy and water have been enthusiastically requested! (These will be completed for fall 2018—food will be used again in the 2017-18 academic year.) Also covered will be Government sites useful for history research. This highlights the opportunities that may exist to promote Government resources via curricular means. In addition, Government resources are useful for non-academic communities. There will be brainstorming with the attendees for other possible topical venues. While much of the time will be spent on showing the page and links of interest, discussion of future topical areas to consider will be part of the session. Attendees are invited to provide URLs for other topical Government websites they use on a regular basis so that they may be added to the presenter’s “other Government access points” part of her guide and thereby shared with all attendees and anyone who discovers them on the web. It should be a great opportunity to share favorites and learn about other gems.*
