The National Archives

holds historically valuable records of the Federal Government of the United States of America




The National Archives holds records from all three branches of the Federal Government

However, <u>which</u> records we have, and the timeline and process for <u>access</u>, depends on

- When the records were created
- the part of government that created them
- the legal framework that governs them

Federal Agency Records

- Covered by Federal Records Act
- Law instructs agencies to manage all records
- Agencies submit Records Schedules to NARA that list categories of records and proposals that each category should be either:
 - **Temporary** keep for a set period, then destroy
 - **Permanent** keep for a set period, then send to the Archives


Court Records

- Lower Federal Courts
 Federal Records Act
- Judicial Branch Organizations
 - Federal Records Act

Congressional Records



- Historical Records of the US House of Representatives and US Senate
 - Transfer and access not covered by law
 - Available under Rules for Access set by Congress
 - NARA Center for Legislative Archives manages records – for Congress and the public
- Legislative branch organizations
 - Covered by the Federal Records Act

- Presidential Records Act
- Donor Agreements with pre-PRA presidents
- Transfer arrangements with Supreme Court and Congress

Numerical Identification Files (NUMIDENT)

This series contains data from the Social Security Administration's Numerical Identification Files (NUMIDENT). The Death Files contain nearly 50 million records of individuals with a social security number with a verified death or who would have been over 110 years old by December 31, 2007. The records include information such as name, social security number, birth date, and death date.

Central Foreign Policy Files

We have added the 1979 fully releasable permanent electronic telegram records and withdrawal card records and the 1979 fully releasable permanent P-Reel Index records and withdrawal card records of this series to AAD, for an additional 531,525 new records. The series, popularly known as the "State Department Cables" or the "State Department Telegrams," consists of telegrams between the Department of State and Foreign Service posts.



Research Visit FAQs

How can I make my visit more successful?

The National Archives and Records Administration (NARA) reference staff is committed to giving researchers the best possible assistance. The following questions and answers are provided to help researchers have a good on-site experience and take full advantage of their limited time at the National Archives.

Do I need to contact the Archives before I arrive?

Writing or calling in advance is not required; however, we **strongly encourage** researchers to write to the National Archives before making a research visit. Please send the same reference inquiry to only one address to avoid confusion and duplication of work. Making contact before arrival can help prepare researchers for what they will find and help smooth the process when they arrive.

Researchers should make contact far enough in advance to allow the NARA reference staff sufficient time to respond. A good rule of thumb is to write a minimum of 4 weeks before you plan to arrive. This allows time for the staff to log-in requests, to conduct necessary background work, and to prepare and send a response.

If researchers have complex questions that require an in depth consultation or an ongoing exchange, they should write even sooner. Please note, however, that NARA staff cannot undertake research for you. The staff assists researchers with their work by providing information about the records, but it does not undertake substantive research for researchers.
