Planning for Your Disaster and the Aftermath

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What is a Disaster?

- The Obvious Fire, Flood, Earthquake, and Storm.
 - Usually have advanced notice to allow for some sort of preemptive action.


What is a Disaster?

- •The Unexpected Vandalism, Structural and System Failure.
 - Can be devastating, but often localized.

What is a Disaster?

- The Hidden Environmental Conditions and Other Intrusions.
 - Slow and usually undetected, can be local or systemic, and may be mitigated if discovered.
 Some factors may not be fixable.

Other Considerations for Your Plan

- Pre-planning considerations
 - Is your plan approved by Administration? Is it integrated into the overall disaster plan?
 - How much space do you have to evacuate materials? Do you have priorities or a hierarchy for evacuation, preservation or replacement?

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




Information Specific to Your Area


- Are you in a flood zone

Other Considerations for Your Plan


- Other Groups and Agencies
 - Other depository libraries with which evacuation of materials could be coordinated with one library evacuating some materials and the other library responsible for different materials
 - Are there local groups willing to volunteer for clean up duties

The Tangible Collection

- Can you move or protect all or part of your collection? Which part?
- Establish priorities for evacuation, preservation, remediation, or replacement.
- Replacement GPO or commercial? Tangible or electronic?
 Administration support and budgets.
- Consider which parts of your tangible collection are hardest to replace such as historical materials which relate to your area

Services

- Plan for continuation of operations and access to the collection.
 - Inform GPO and your regional of your status and plans.
 - Be aware that in a widespread disaster, there may not be a nearby depository to take over your operations
- Additional services to the community to cope with disaster conditions.
 - Information handouts with contact and other information for relief.
 - Internet access, if possible.
 - Offer information and handouts at local shelters and food distribution points
