

NPS Focus & Research Station

NPS Focus Digital Library & Research Station is a 'one-stop' information service for searching and finding digital resources by and about the National Park Service.

The Focus Digital Library component of system launches the NPS enterprise image management server and makes available a growing collection of digital content, including photos, reports, drawings, maps, and GIS images.

The Focus Research Station component provides searching across diverse categories of information resources (library catalogs, image databases, GIS, websites) distributed on multiple platforms managed by different system owners.

Features

- Search from one point across a choice of NPS and partner systems
- Users may browse digital content by subject or park
- Image Server manages reports, drawings, pictures, maps, GIS imagery
- Users can zoom, pan, change image size and format on the fly or download an image to high resolution TIFF for printing and publication
- Images are very fast-loading and require low bandwidth since they are compressed and served with client-server caching
- Records can be selected and exported as bibliographies or Excel files
- Public view of sensitive information may be applied at the record level
- Upload and attach images to enhance budget requests
- Users may discover and download images for presentations or management and interpretive reports

Technical Specifications

NPS Focus integrates two systems: Blue Angel Technologies MetaStar for handling metadata management and search gateway functions; and, LizardTech Inc. ExpressServer for image management. Both components are state-of-the-art and based on open standards including all national metadata standards, XML, XSL, ANSI Z39.50, and SOAP Messaging.

Benefit to the Service and Public

From one place on the Web, NPS staff and public can access park or program information across multiple systems using a common search interface.



- Search and use text and images to develop management reports and interpretive presentations
- Display Civil War Monuments and National Register of Historic Places images and documents.
- Documenting disasters before & after images

NPS VOYAGER Online Library Catalog (http://www.library.nps.gov) DID YOU KNOW?

- Implemented with state-of-the-art Voyager library software (also used by Library of Congress, etc.)
- ➤ Over a third of NPS regional office, service center and park libraries have contributed record sets *
- Currently contains catalog records for 199,075 distinct titles, representing 345,798 library holdings
- Can also be searched alongside myriad other NPS databases & Web resources via NPS Focus system
- > Supported by the OCIO-National Information Systems Center (NISC), NPS Library Program

How TIC Information Is Used

- identify NPS plans for use as models or standards for new projects
- discover ideas used to solve similar planning and design problems
- obtain NPS concessionaire information and plans
- develop descriptions of the cultural and natural context of a site, e.g., cultural landscapes
- aid in disaster recovery—e.g., rebuilding a damaged structure or landscape
- familiarize an NPS customer with a facility under consideration for lease
- increase public understanding of NPS resources
- provide research material to professional and amateur writers

- furnish plans to builders of scale models
- supply historical information to readers of history
- help legal researchers obtain documentation of how things were done in the past
- provide general research for resource management and park planning


