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Social Capital (1)

- Robert D. Putnam, in Bowling Alone, examines the evolution of the concept of social capital (a term coined in 1916)
- Putnam defines social capital as: The sum total of advantages in productivity that derive from the social ties inherent in human networks

Social Capital (2)

- Social capital creates advantages for individuals (e.g., networking with colleagues can lead to career advancement)
- Social capital also creates cumulative advantages that are external to participants in the social network
- Expectations of reciprocity in social networks can be quid pro quo; or
- Even more valuable: generalized reciprocity

Depository Community Assumptions (1)

- Every depository provides service to primary target communities, as well as to the general public
- Crucial for each depository to identify the types and levels of its communities, determining interactions, as well as intersections of interest and need

Depository Community Assumptions (2)

- Effective local policies and standards of service result when the various needs of a depository's communities are satisfied to the best extent of available library resources
- The FDLP is a partnership: depositories both contribute to—and tap into—the social capital of the depository program

Depository Community Concentrics

- Community of depository staff
- Community of all library staff
- Community of all staff plus administration
- Community of library & primary user group(s)
- Community of library and all area residents
- Community of depository region, guided by a regional or state plan
- Community of all depositories, along with the resources and staff of GPO

Community is Foundation of FDLP

- Reason for Congressional district designations? Geographic: to ensure local community access to government information
- Tangible distribution > Collection mentality > Documents to the People
- Electronic distribution > Service mentality > Information service to the People
- Geographic awareness of community and social capital perhaps even more important for depositories in the electronic era

Two Propositions

- The Benton Harbor Public Library is 2006 Depository Library of the Year primarily because of its extraordinary awareness of the needs of its many communities and because it has creatively tailored its depository program to address those needs
- In the process, Benton Harbor's depository has contributed to the social capital of southwestern Michigan

Benton Harbor's Physical Setting (1)

- Located on Michigan's S.W. lower peninsula
- Town has mix of post-industrial and agricultural influences
- The city and county are near no major population center
- Nearest large cities are Kalamazoo (50 mi.) and South Bend (45 mi.)
- Chicago is about 90 miles away

BH Depository History, 1989-2006

- 1989 inspection: unsatisfactory in 6 out of 7 rating categories
- 1990 re-inspection: unsatisfactory in 2 out of 7 rating categories
- By 1995 inspection, compliant in all categories
- Jill Rauh became depository coordinator in 1996
- 2006 Depository of the Year Award

What Did They Do to Improve?

- After 1989 inspection, developed written policies for collection development, documents processing and piece-level recordation
- Provided better training for document processing
- Starting in 1996, developed marketing strategies

Benton Harbor "Hard" Marketing (1)

- Designed a simple Web site that features links to government information sources
- Started an e-mail based reference service
- Sends "document of the month" current awareness announcements to the list maintained by the Southwest Michigan Library Cooperative (25-30 libraries of all types)

Benton Harbor "Hard" Marketing (2)

- Sends "as needed" messages to this list; e.g., I phoned Jill Rauh Nov. 8 and she had already sent out links to the Nov. 7 election results
- Sends e-mails, with links to new government reports or statistical sources, to key people in city/county agencies and the Berrien County (MI) economic development department

Benton Harbor "Hard" Marketing (3)

- Tries new outreach activities, modifying them if they don't work
- Programming didn't work for Benton Harbor community, so now they concentrate on serving users one-on-one, using a dedicated computer in the library and ample personalized help
- Liberal use of displays

Benton Harbor "Hard" Marketing (4)

- Time spent doing this?
- Jill Rauh says: "An hour or two a week"

Benton Harbor "Soft" Marketing (1)

- Since 2000 has bought Marcive cataloging and loaded records into the cooperative catalog of the Southwestern Michigan system
- Loads records for items selected
- Also purchases the Marcive product
 Documents Without Shelves, so the full array
 of remotely-accessed government
 information cataloged by GPO is available
- Cost? Minor compared to great advantages

Benton Harbor "Soft" Marketing (2)

- Catalog records with their holdings attached results in numerous interlibrary loan requests and some e-mail requests from out of area
- Patrons often ask for specific documents they've found in the catalog; and for help with electronic publications linked to from catalog
- Even though their physical documents collection is separate from main collection, cataloging opens access to that collection

Benton Harbor "Soft" Marketing (3)

- Reference service philosophy: few reference questions will not benefit from consulting government information resources
- 75% of all Benton Harbor reference questions are answered, wholly or in part, using government information resources
- Benton Harbor has internalized government information into reference service; it is the lens through which all questions are filtered

The Benton Harbor Philosophy (1)

- Think small and embody community awareness
- Think poor, but act rich
- Filter reference service through the lens of government information
- Be excited about what you do because it matters in the daily lives of the residents of all of your communities, from library staff to your public to the nation

The Benton Harbor Philosophy (2)

"Participation in the depository library system connects our institution to the world outside our community. Both our staff and our users benefit from this connection to the ideas that come to us from statewide and national sources"—Frederick J. Kirby
