

At a Federal depository library? Provide access to ALL FDLP content and catalog or point to the content that is most useful to your patrons.

FDLP content consists of:



Tangible resources (including print, microfiche, and CD-ROMs) that your library selected through the FDLP and have in the library or at selective housing sites. Some FDLP Basic Collection titles are available in tangible formats. Catalog all current receipts.



Online only publications available in the Catalog of U.S. Government Publications (CGP) including FDLP Basic Collection and Federal Digital System titles.  FEDERAL DIGITAL SYSTEM AMERICA'S AUTHENTIC GOVERNMENT INFORMATION

The CGP links to the FDLP Web Archive, which includes uncataloged content.

GPO's MetaLib resources. The CGP links to MetaLib, a federated search engine that searches multiple U.S. Federal Government databases, retrieving reports, articles, and citations and providing direct links to resources available online.



Official online content partnership resources from library or Federal agency partners who have made content available for free, public access. Content is available from partner sites and is or will be cataloged in the CGP.



"Agency subscription database", currently the Homeland Security Digital Library. Depository libraries have no-fee access to the full database. Each interested library must register for access by either IP authentication or use of a username and password.

Every depository library is required to have each individual title in the Basic Collection accessible for immediate use because these titles are vital sources of information that support the public's right to know about the workings and essential activities of their Federal Government. How this is accomplished is a local decision. Catalog each title, catalog the collection, link to the titles or the collection from web pages or guides, or use a combination of these.

The only resources that your library must select by item number are the tangible publications.

Each depository library "develops" an "online collection," a group of online Federal information products that the library determines best meets the Federal Government information needs of the community served. The collection is made visible and promoted to the user community through activities such as cataloging or inclusion on library web pages or guides. Reference and other public services are provided for them. Public services and activities to promote visibility are naturally focused on the areas that take advantage of the subject expertise of the library and that best meet the information needs of the community.
