Researchers can now explore the foundational contributions of Africans in early American history with this fully searchable digitized resource, showcasing printed works from the 1500s to the 1770s.

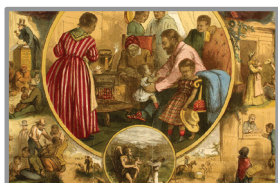
African Americans and Revolutionary America: Freedom and Oppression, 1772-1804

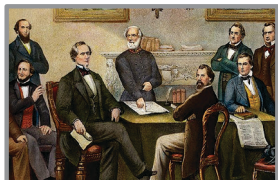

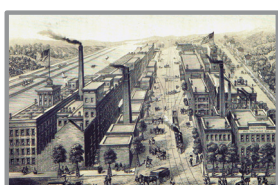
