 - ► BLS projections serve as an input for state and local employment projections




Employment Projections Users and Uses




Total Nonagriculture Wage and Salary Employment






Service-Providing Industries Currently Have Most Employment

Thousands of wage and salary jobs, 2021






Health Care and Social Assistance is Projected to Continue to Grow






Leisure and Hospitality is Projected to Mostly Recover






Manufacturing is Projected to Have Little Change





Retail Trade has the Largest Projected Employment Decline








Employment Change vs. Percent Employment Change






Office and Administrative Support is the Largest Occupational Group










STEM Occupations are Projected to Grow Much Faster than Average



Education and Training Classification

- Consists of three categories of information for each occupation:
 - 1) Typical education needed for entry
 - 2) Work experience in a related occupation
 - 3) Typical on-the-job training needed to attain competency in the occupation
- Assignments to each category based on BLS research
 - Quantitative research
 - American Community Survey (ACS) data
 - O*NET data
 - National Center for Education Statistics (NCES) data
 - Qualitative research, including interviews with occupational experts






Occupations that Need More Education for Entry are Projected to Grow Faster*

Projected 2021–31 growth rate in occupational employment by typical 2021 entry-level education






Graduate Degree Occupations with the Largest Job Growth



Doctoral or Professional Degree Occupations with the Largest Job Growth






Bachelor's Degree Occupations with the Largest Job Growth





Associate's Degree Occupations with the Largest Job Growth




High School Diploma Occupations with the Largest Job Growth





No Formal Educational Credential Occupations with the Largest Job Growth






