- Trains law and policy students to develop real-world solutions for a more sustainable and just food system








## Knowledge Equity, Wikipedia & USDA

Over the past several years, USDA has prioritized advancing racial justice, equity and access in its mission and programs. Including the creation of Equity Commission.

## Knowledge Equity, Wikipedia & USDA

- NAL supports USDA's Equity commitments in three ways:
  - Enhancing Wikipedia content
  - Holding equity-related programming (often with editing components)
  - Supports the Equity Commission through research





#### Meaningful Contributions

- Contributing to Wikipedia does NOT have to mean writing new articles it can mean:
- Adding references
- Adding media to Wikimedia Commons (Participating in the DPLA Pipeline, if you are a DPLA contributing institution)
- Adding images from Commons to Wikipedia
- Updating facts in articles
- Improving articles about research, government information and programs, etc.

## DPLA Pipeline

- DPLA members are eligible to participate in the Wikimedia/DPLA pipeline
- This eases access to digital items and saves institutions time on Commons uploads
- Makes items readily accessible, and easy to formulate events and initiatives around.

## Implementing Wikipedia programming

- Focus: Align Wikipedia goals with Departmental goals – how can you address goals with Wikipedia programming?
- The topic and outreach matters!
  - Outreach is done based on topic. Consider what will interest your colleagues and others.
  - Is this an opportunity for public outreach? Sharing the mission with a broader audience?
- Successful events typically include some kind of informational session & editing



#### Engage

- With the Wikipedia community! That's how you get experienced editors.
- Reach out to local user groups:
  - Wikimedia DC
  - Wikimedia New York City
  - Wikimedians of Indiana
- Connecting with the community is a sign of good faith, encourages experienced editors to join, and creates community support when it is needed.



## Speakers

- Communication plan from the beginning
- Look for internal speakers
- Consider collaborators
  - Who is bringing unique experiences and can help understand the experiences of historically excluded individuals/communities?



### Inclusive Language

- Consider your target audience & appropriate language
  - Check with equity office to use appropriate language
- Be mindful of framework around issues you may be discussing




#### Notes on events

- Start early
- Plan for accommodations as needed (start at least 2 weeks early)
- Plan for a moderator keeps conversation flowing, filters out unnecessary questions
- Plan for *after* 
  - Should it be recorded?
  - How will the recording be accessed?
  - Does it need captions?
