





Facts at a Glance

In fiscal 2024, the Library of Congress:



Responded to *764k reference requests from Congress, the public and other federal agencies.¹



Recorded 149.3m visits and 505.3m page views across the Library's websites.



Circulated more than 22.2m copies of braille, audio and large print items to patrons, via the National Library Service for the Blind and Print Disabled and its network of state and local libraries.



Issued 424.2k copyright registrations and recorded 17k documents containing 1.7m works.



Circulated 402k items for use inside and outside the Library.




Issued 68.8k reader cards



Recorded more than 9.7m items under inventory control at Fort Meade or Cabin Branch.




Recorded more than 181.1m items in its collections. Those collections include:
















TEACHER'S GUIDE **ANALYZING PRIMARY SOURCES**



Guide students with the sample questions as they respond to the primary source. Encourage them to go back and forth between the columns; there is no correct order.

OBSERVE

Have students identify and note details.

What do you notice first? - Find something small but interesting. · What do you notice that you didn't expect? · What do you notice that you can't explain? · What do you notice now that you didn't

REFLECT

Encourage students to generate and test hypotheses about the source.

Where do you think this came from? · Why do you think somebody made this? · What do you think was happening when this was made? · Who do you think was the audience for this item? · What tool was used to create this? · Why do you think this item is important? . If someone made this today. what would be different? · What can you learn from examining this?

QUESTION

Have students ask questions to lead to more observations and reflections.

What do you wonder about...

who? · what? · when? · where? · why? · how?

FURTHER INVESTIGATION

Help students to identify questions appropriate for further investigation, and to develop a research strategy for finding answers.

Sample Question: What more do you want to know, and how can you find out?

A few follow-up Beginning activity ideas:

Have students compare two related primary source items.

Have students expand or alter textbook explanations of history based on primary sources they study.

Ask students to consider how a series of primary sources support or challenge information and understanding on a particular topic Have students refine or revise conclusions based on their study of each subsequent primary source.




