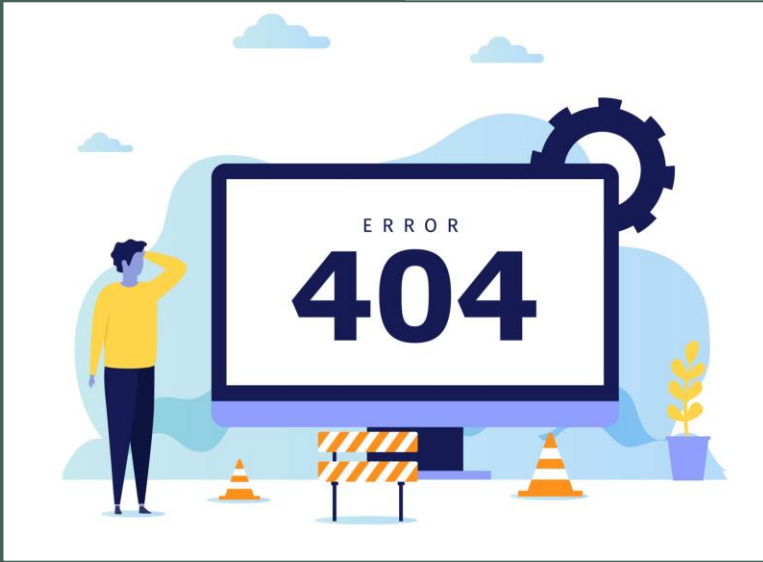

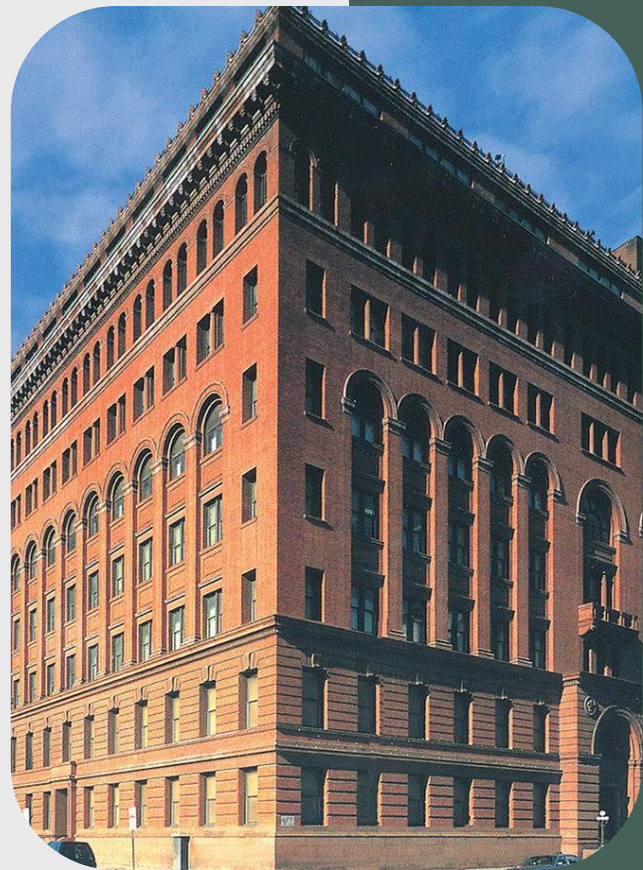

Historical Context

“The nine most terrifying words in the English language are ‘I’m from the government and I’m here to help.’” Ronald Reagan, Press conference on August 12th, 1986.

The quote conveys his overall hostility towards government, even though he served two terms as California governor and president. His administration viewed government publication economics as more important than the public’s right to know and conveying government’s activities/research to the public.

Reform 88. The administration created a task force to improve management and administrative systems, but for publications it was to reduce spending. The task force’s publications are only available at the Reagan library.

OMB Bulletin 81-16. (contained in a series bulletins. 81-16 begins on page 74). The OMB used it to eliminate collection and publication of government information. It resulted in a moratorium on new publications and **OMB Bulletin 81-16 supplement 1** furthered that effort. Begins on page 67).

OMB Circular 130. (marked a continuation of Reagan Administration’s effort to reduce the flow of federal government information.

FROM: Charles Ezell, Acting Director, U.S. Office of Personnel Management

DATE: January 29, 2025

RE: Initial Guidance Regarding President Trump's Executive Order *Defending Women*.

Pursuant to its authority under 5 U.S.C. § 1103(a)(1) and (a)(5), the U.S. Office of Personnel Management (OPM) is providing the following initial guidance to agencies regarding the President's Executive Order entitled *Defending Women from Gender Ideology Extremism and Restoring Biological Truth to the Federal Government (Defending Women)*.

Steps to End Federal Funding of Gender Ideology: In light of *Defending Women*, each agency should take prompt actions to end all agency programs that use taxpayer money to promote or reflect gender ideology as defined in Section 2(f) of *Defending Women*. Specifically, agency heads should take the following steps:

1. No later than **5:00 p.m. EST on Friday, January 31, 2025**
 - a. Send an email to all agency employees announcing that the agency will be complying with *Defending Women* and this guidance.
 - b. Review all agency programs, contracts, and grants, and terminate any that promote or inculcate gender ideology.

Office of Personnel Management's Federal Employee Viewpoint Survey (FEVS) cancellation

After months of postponing, OPM opts to fully cancel 2025 FEVS

The cancellation comes after OPM indefinitely delayed FEVS earlier this year, due to the Trump administration's "urgent" changes for federal employees.

The Office of Personnel Management has officially canceled this year's version of the signature survey that assesses governmentwide satisfaction and engagement levels of federal employees.

In a memo distributed to agency chief human capital officers on Friday afternoon, obtained by Federal News Network, OPM said after initially only delaying the survey, it has now fully scrapped plans to conduct the 2025 Federal Employee Viewpoint Survey.

"In view of President Trump's realignment of the federal workforce, and in order to thoughtfully recalibrate the FEVS to align with administration objectives, OPM has decided not to administer the FEVS this year," OPM wrote in the email to agency CHCOs. "Instead, OPM will update the questions and resume administering the FEVS on its regular schedule. To ensure efficient resource allocation, OPM requests that agencies consult with it before undertaking any preparations to administer the FEVS or a similar survey at an agency or component level."

OPM's announcement on Friday comes after the agency [indefinitely delayed](#) the timeline for FEVS to give agencies more bandwidth to focus on the Trump administration's "urgent" efforts to restructure the federal workforce.

Canceling the 2025 FEVS means OPM will not be collecting or publishing governmentwide data on federal employees' views this year of their jobs, colleagues, agency leaders or overall workplaces. Once the FEVS returns in 2026, OPM said it will be updating some of the survey questions as well.

Although the specific changes to FEVS are unclear, OPM [outlined initial plans](#) earlier this year to bring back survey questions on poor performers and remove questions related to diversity, equity, inclusion and accessibility (DEIA). In April, the Trump administration also combed through the past few years of FEVS reports

U.S. Department of Education Initiates Reduction in Force

MARCH 11, 2025

As part of the Department of Education's final mission, the Department today initiated a reduction in force (RIF) impacting nearly 50% of the Department's workforce. Impacted Department staff will be placed on administrative leave beginning Friday, March 21st.

"Today's reduction in force reflects the Department of Education's commitment to efficiency, accountability, and ensuring that resources are directed where they matter most: to students, parents, and teachers," said **Secretary of Education Linda McMahon**. "I appreciate the work of the dedicated public servants and their contributions to the Department. This is a significant step toward restoring the greatness of the United States education system."

The Department of Education will continue to deliver on all statutory programs that fall under the agency's purview, including formula funding, student loans, Pell Grants, funding for special needs students, and competitive grantmaking.

All divisions within the Department are impacted by the reduction, with some divisions requiring significant reorganization to better serve students, parents, educators, and taxpayers.

Background

When President Trump was inaugurated, the Department's workforce stood at 4,133 workers. After today's actions, the Department's workforce will total roughly 2,183 workers. Included in the reduction in force are nearly 600 employees who accepted voluntary resignation opportunities and retirement over the last seven weeks, including:

- 259 employees accepted the [Deferred Resignation Program](#)
- 313 employees accepted the [Voluntary Separation Incentive Payment](#)

Remaining employees impacted by the reduction in force will be placed on administrative leave beginning next Friday, March 21. Pursuant to regulatory requirements and the Department's collective bargaining agreement, all impacted employees will receive full pay and benefits until June 9th, as well as substantial severance pay or retirement benefits based upon their length of service.

The news media has widely reported the current U.S. administration's removal and modification of federal websites and information. As academic librarians, we have also heard from faculty and researchers about their work being removed without notice, and received many questions from academics and the public about how widespread this phenomena is.

Librarians, data experts, and others have launched many excellent projects to preserve missing information and data. In particular, we take inspiration from projects including the long-standing [End of Term Archive](#), the newer [Data Rescue Project](#), and [many others](#). While removed or threatened data has been [well-tracked](#) by various data rescue groups, we hope to supplement these efforts by focusing on tracking non-data materials and information that have been impacted.

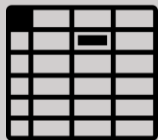

Take Action

- Integrate awareness of at-risk information and preservation efforts in relevant reference and instruction.
- Teach users about web archiving efforts and how to find missing materials.
- “See something, save something” - save webpages you think are important to the Wayback Machine or other web archiving tools.
- Collaborate locally with faculty/staff to spot risks.
- Report broken depository PURLs to GPO - they can link to archived versions.
- Submit missing non-depository materials to the Gov Info Tracker submission form.
